Interested in Wabash College history? The Wabash Archives tells the story of our alma mater.

The formal name of the Archives is Robert T. Ramsay, Jr. Archival Center. It is located in the lower level of Lilly Library. When you go to the Archives, you will expect to see, and will see, old things. What will bring you joy is that the Archives is overseen by two young men full of knowledge and energy.

Nolan Eller '11 started in 2021, succeeding the legend Beth Swift. This was like Mickey Mantle replacing Joe DiMaggio. Nolan graduated from Lafayette Jefferson High School. While at Wabash he majored in History and minored in Political. In 2013, he earned his Master of Library Science (MLS) with a concentration in Archives and Records Management from Indiana University's School of Library and Information Science in Bloomington. While working on his degree, he completed internships at historically-focused organizations, including the Carnegie Museum of Montgomery County, the Indiana State Archives, Indiana University Archives, Purdue University Archives and Special Collections, and the Tippecanoe County (Indiana) Historical Association.

Before becoming Wabash's Archivist, Nolan served as the Assistant Archivist at Northwestern State University in Natchitoches, Louisiana, and as the University Archivist and Head of Special Collections at Louisiana Tech University in Ruston, Louisiana.

Evan Miller, Wabash's new Digital Archivist, came to Wabash in 2022. Among other responsibilities, he develops and curates the Archives' digital collections and exhibits. Evan hails from Montgomery County and graduated from Hanover College in 2017 with a major in Computer Science and minors in Art and Design. In 2019, he earned a Masters in History and an MLIS at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis. He has worked at several Indiana-centric archives, museums, and cultural heritage organizations including the Hanover College Archives and the Butler University Archives.

The Archives consist of tangible items such as clothing and portraits. The Archives, however, are not limited to physical materials. Nolan and Evan are building upon the College's digital collections and are actively working to expand access to the amazing collections of the archival center.

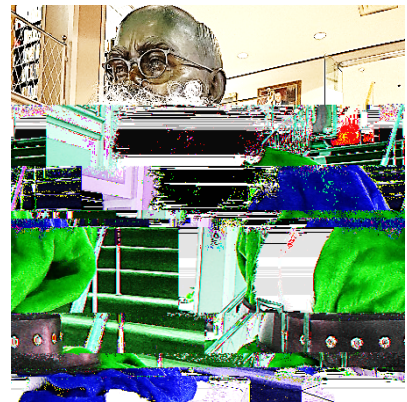
The team has many seniors plus a transfer student who stands 7'2". With about one second left in the game against DePauw on November 29, he guarded the DePauw player who was trying to make an inbounds pass in front of the DePauw bench. The frustrated opponent could barely see the court when he ineffectually made his in-bounds pass. Wabash hung on for a 1-point victory, 62-61.

The Wabash team will be playing in a two-day tourney at Catholic University in Washington, D.C., December 19 and 20. The local alumni group will be hosting pregame gatherings before each game at Brookland Pint, which is near the campus.

Wabash lost the Monon Bell in double overtime against an undefeated DePauw team, 33-30. The Little Giants attempted a winning field goal in the first overtime, but DePauw blocked it. Wabash leads the overall series at 63-57-9. More than 8,100 attended the game.
